The G20 president invites a number of guest nations each year to participate in G20 activities and influence the agenda. This global participation ensures that the G20 represents a wide variety of international views. India's G-20 presidency provides a unique opportunity to foster more South-South cooperation. The proposed international workshop aims to document how mainstreaming gender in the pursuit of climate justice has been impacted by India's G-20 presidency. An appraisal of this nature is crucial for many reasons. First, there are the gendered effects of climate change. Second, over 80% of the world's greenhouse gas emissions originate from G-20 nations. The aims of the Paris Agreement won't become a reality until policies that are gender inclusive are adopted. In addition, a sufficient amount of attention must be paid to women's empowerment and participation in order to achieve the net-zero target announced by several G-20 nations and the lofty goals of an inclusive and action-oriented goal announced by India as G-20 president.

Objectives

The workshop's goal is to provide a forum for discussing significant advancements in the fields of energy security and climate finance, which India has designated as its G-20 priority areas from a gender perspective. The main objective of the workshop is to recommend the most effective climate finance methods and other pragmatic initiatives for empowering women to lead the transition to renewable energy. The specific objectives include,

- to explore the feasibility of India's G-20 focus on climate finance and energy on gender empowerment during and beyond its presidential mandate, especially in South Asia;
- to formulate the most pragmatic climate finance methods and other practical initiatives for the empowerment of women to lead the transition to renewable energy;
- to assess the formulation and interpretation of gender-inclusive and equitable climate change policy during India's G-20 Presidency.
