Diaspora and Transnationalism

(Optional Course for MA)

Total Credits: 4

Objectives of the Coure

This course is an exploration of the concepts of migration, diaspora and transnationalism and their intersections with theory and practice. The course examines various perspectives and issues related to migration and diaspora studies addressing the following questions: what are the forces and factors of migration?; what are connections between globalization, transnationalism and diaspora?; what is the nature of the interface between global and local phenomena? The course will also introduce students to the major themes in South Asian migration and diaspora. It particularly seeks to explore the history of South Asian migrants in the Europe, United States and elsewhere. Each of these diaspora communities of South Asian origin has a distinct story. In this course, we will examine the parallels and divergences in these narratives which are all connected through the idea of the 'homeland.' Some of the most current scholarship on the South Asian migration and diaspora will be consulted to examine issues of culture, ethnicity, identity, gender and sexuality, assimilation, acculturation, multiculturalism and discrimination. The course will draw from multidisciplinary sources, combining academic readings and theoretical essays along with films and works of fiction to understand complex issues of migration and diaspora. The suggested readings contain an extensive list of possible texts. The course instructor will select a series of texts from each section that will become compulsory texts for the course each time it is offered.

Course Structure:

UNIT-1: Migration Studies

This unit puts great emphasis on some of the key concepts, theories and processes related to migration studies. The unit will address the following issues: Understanding of Migration; defining migration; Key concepts and typology of migration; Patterns of Migration, Theorizing Migration: New classical approaches; Marxist approaches; Globalization approaches; Migration and developmental approaches: Post-modern approaches, Process of Migration: Historical and contemporary migration processes including brief history of South Asian migration; Networks and ethnic enclaves, Melting pot or Salad Bowl; Governance, citizenship, assimilation and acculturation debates, globalization and societies in transition.

Unit-2: Diaspora Studies

This unit explores the diaspora issues in the interactive zone of various social science and humanities disciplines such as history, sociology, social anthropology and cultural studies. It includes the historical context of South Asian diaspora, civilizational heritage of diasporic communities, continuities and transformations in culture, economy and political life as well as the processes and dynamics of communication and linkages between South Asia and the diaspora. The South Asian diaspora today constitutes an important, and in some respects

unique force in world culture. The unit will address the following themes in diaspora studies: Definition, types, creation of diaspora: conceptual framework, Theoretical and methodological implications of diasporic cultures and peoples; Post-modern approach to culture and place; Travel, displacement and movement, The process of emigration, settlement and Changing identities, multiculturalism and identity formation in the host societies, Migration and Homeland: Memories, Narratives and Oral Histories, Diaspora and Tansnationalism: Transnational networks and linkages between South Asia and the diaspora, and between diasporic communities, Mapping South Asian Diaspora: Ethnographic studies.
